Teaching Experience

2007 - 2016, Graduate Student Instructor, UC Berkeley

I taught ten undergraduate courses at Berkeley on various aspects of the history, culture and literature of Island Southeast Asia.

Specifically, within the South and Southeast Asian Studies department, I taught 10A, *Cultures, Peoples and Polities of Mainland Southeast Asia*, once; 10B, *The History and Cultures of Island Southeast Asia* four times; and R5A and R5B, reading and composition courses focused on the literature of Southeast Asia five times.

The five R5A and R5B courses, as well as one of the 10B courses, I taught independently and was solely responsible for all course content.

- Repeatedly taught classes of 20 to 25 undergraduate students a variety of courses on the history and literature of Island Southeast Asia
- Incorporated a strong research component in each course. Students were responsible to produce a ten page research paper at the end of the semester on an aspect of the history of the region.
- Consistently received an course average instructor rating of from my students.
- Received the 2014 Outstanding Graduate Student Instructor Award.

Interests

I am dedicated to expanding the use of digital technologies within the humanities. In my own work I use Mendeley to archive my digital references, JabRef to manage citations, Zim for notetaking, Vim for editing, and MEX for document production. My 945 page dissertation was written entirely in MEX. I conduct all of my work in Debian.
